#### Keep These Tips in Mind to Arrive Alive!

#### **Pedestrian Safety**

- **Use sidewalks** when walking, but if one isn't available, walk on the shoulder of the road facing traffic.
- Always walk in pairs and let your parents know where you are going.
- Cross at a designated crosswalk or intersection when crossing a busy street.
- Avoid texting or using ear buds when walking so that you can see and hear approaching traffic.
- Increase visibility at night by carrying a flashlight and wearing reflective clothing.

#### **Bicycle Safety**

- Wear the Proper Gear Helmet, bright clothing, and elbow and knee pads.
- Ride in Right Direction Ride with the flow of traffic on the right side of the highway.
- **Do a Safety Check** Inspect tires, brakes and chains before each ride.
- Use Bike Paths Or stay on lightly traveled streets.
- Follow a Buddy System Always tell someone where you are going.
- Put away your cell phone and ear buds so that you can see and hear approaching traffic.
- Never let others pressure you into riding unsafely!

#### Passenger Safety

- Buckle up Always wear your seat belt!
- Avoid Distracting the Driver Talk quietly, keep music low, and stay seated.
- Speak Up Call or text a parent to come get you if you feel unsafe riding with any driver!

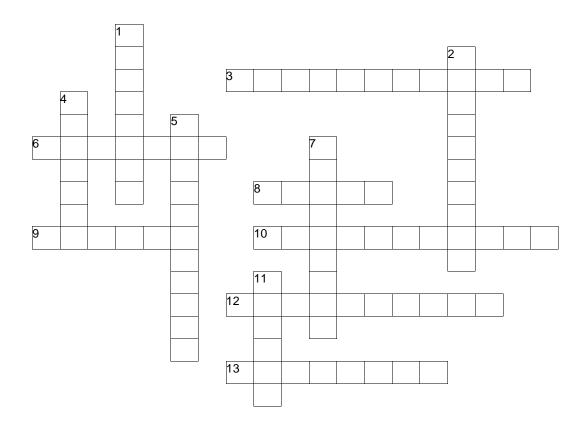


# Activity Ideas to Help Lead Change in Your Community

- Ask a restaurant, church, or youth center to put buckle up messages on their marquee board or inside their building. To get resources for this activity, contact YOVASO's Casey Taylor at casey.taylor@vsp.virginia.gov.
- Send a text to your friends and loved ones each week reminding them to buckle up and be a safe passenger.
- If you attend a youth group, gym, pool, or visit another organization where you have access to a bulletin board, ask if you can design it to include safety messages like, "Buckle Up Now. Arrive Alive" or "Always Wear a Helmet When Biking – Arrive Alive."
- At your school, church, youth group, pool, or home, ask if you can use sidewalk chalk to write the following
  message at the front entrance: "Take a step in the right direction. Buckle Up and Be a Safe Passenger."
- Start a poster design contest for youth and adults in your school or neighborhood who want to participate!
   Ask them to include a message reminding everyone to buckle up and Arrive Alive. Display the posters in a highly visible place.
- Use sidewalk chalk to write buckle up messages on sidewalks, parking lots or other visible areas at your school or in your community. Remember to always ask permission from the appropriate parties!
- Make a driver or passenger safety themed video to show at school or on social media. Seat belts or bike safety would be great topics to address.
- Everyone loves a good parade! When the Fourth of July rolls around, work with your community to put together a bike parade to raise awareness for driver and passenger safety. Everyone in the neighborhood can decorate their bikes in red, white, and blue and include their own traffic safety message!
- If your school has bike racks, ask if you can spruce them up with a fresh coat of paint and add a message to always wear a helmet.
- Be creative, have fun, and come up with your own ideas. The goal is to help keep you and your friends safe!

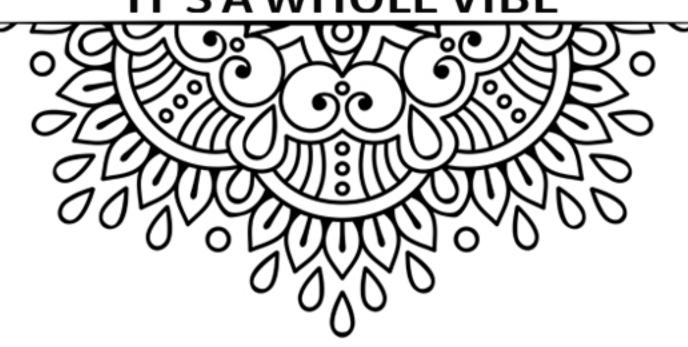

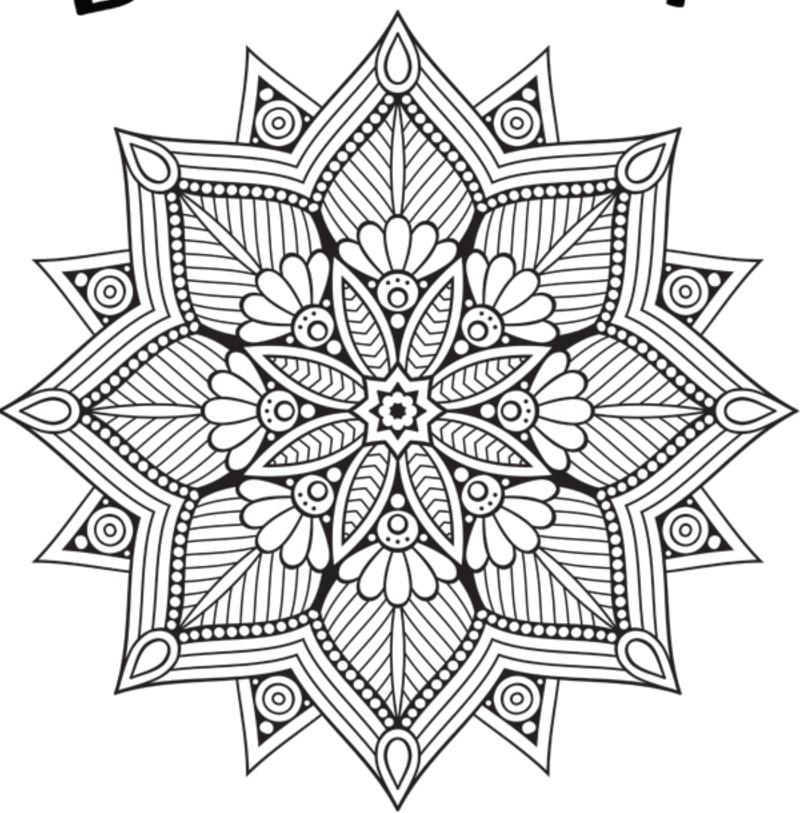
